CONFERENCE PERIODS

The directors' main conference period is 8th Block.

Please understand that our communication to you – the parents – is a very high priority for us. We want to take care of concerns and make every situation the best for each student. Please contact us for clarification on any concerns before they become major issues.

Due to sectionals, rehearsals, and student help sessions, it is difficult to reach us before or after school. If we are working with students, please understand that they are our highest priority and deserve our complete attention.

<u>E-mail Policy</u>

We will be sending home many updates and communications via e-mail throughout the year. Due to the nature of e-mail, all major concerns will need to be addressed through conferences or phone communication. This is to avoid any misunderstandings or unclear intentions through e-mail communication. Parents are encouraged to use e-mail to get more information or clarification regarding events, or to schedule a parent conference.

Student Communication

Students are also encouraged to communicate with the directors before concerns become issues. They should do this in person at an appropriate time, one on one. Again, clarification and solid communication will keep everything running smoothly throughout the entire year.

Throughout the year, we will be sending quite a bit of information home in the form of letters. Please make every effort to read this information carefully, check calendars often and keep us informed of any conflicts. The sooner we know of a situation, the more options we have in solving problems.

Conduct Expectations

Band members will observe all procedures set forth by MCS, in addition to the following, as they pertain to the instrumental music setting:

 Any behavior which is not representative of good citizenship, as perceived by the band staff, may result in the student's dismissal from the activity at hand as well as the band program. This also applies to the actions of student leaders in both public and private events.

- All students are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the Madison County Discipline Policy. Individual behavior during a band function is a reflection of the group.
- Students will follow directors' instructions.
- Students will be in their assigned rehearsal area with all necessary equipment at the beginning of rehearsal time.
- Students will keep their hands and feet to themselves.
- All cell phones, tablets, laptops, etc. are to be kept in backpacks during rehearsal or class.
- Students will not use or play on equipment they do not own without permission from a director.
- Students will not touch, handle, borrow, or use anyone else's instrument, uniform, or personal belongings.
- Students should request permission to speak by raising their hand and waiting to be acknowledged. All rehearsals are expected to be extremely quiet so that time will be utilized as wisely and efficiently as possible.
- When allowed in the band hall, either before or after school, students will not disturb any rehearsal in progress.
- Students will respect the property of others, and return their equipment to its proper storage place when not in use. Students should keep their equipment in the designated storage area, and keep said storage area clean and neat in appearance. Students who have difficulty with this may lose the privilege of having a storage area in the band hall.
- Students will not deface or mark on music stands, chairs, walls, etc.
- Students will not write on the dry-erase boards without permission from a director.
- Students will utilize their assigned storage slot for instrument cases during rehearsals. Cases should not be brought into rehearsals unless requested by a director

Financial Obligations

There is a mandatory fee of \$50 which will include the cost of the t-shirt, binder, contest fees, music, and basic operating costs. See the last page for additional details. Check, Cash, money order, cashier's check, and Charms Payments are the payment options. Please see the Band Fee attachment for more details regarding paying on Charms.

Fundraising

On August 26th & 27th we are starting our Annual Fundraiser with Burnham Enterprises. The purpose is to raise money to purchase additional instruments for the GMS Band program. More information will be sent home the second week of school.

There may be additional fundraisers throughout the year to raise money for band trips and for the indoor color guard fee.

The GMS Bands

Beginning Band is a fundamental preparatory class where the basic skills of playing are addressed. Students will be taught in "like" instrument classes instead of a full band class. In this way, the problems relating to each individual instrument can be properly addressed and the level of individual achievement on the part of the student is greatly accelerated. Students will perform at concerts and contests throughout the school year

Care of Facilities

- No gum, food or drinks are allowed in the band hall except when authorized by the directors.
- All trash is to be deposited in the wastebaskets provided.
- Acts of vandalism or the willful misuse of school property will be dealt with severely and appropriately. Every band member is responsible to help the directors monitor the facility and control vandalism, which includes but is not limited to writing or carving on walls, destroying music, or breaking school property.
- Absolutely no student is allowed in the workroom without permission.
- Practice and ensemble rooms are designed for practicing, not social gatherings.
- Please knock on office doors; and, if you are invited in, you may enter. Otherwise, offices are off limits to students. Students may not use directors' phones without permission.
- The telephone in the band hall may not be used by non-band members. This phone is not to be used for personal calls, but may be used to call parents for rides, etc.
- Students must ask permission to use the phone and all calls will be limited to two minutes.
- Non-Band students are not allowed in the band hall. Ever!

Attendance

In order to have and maintain a high-quality band program, each member's attendance is essential. While the GMS band follows all school and district policies and procedures, the following additional guidelines outline the attendance procedures and policies for the GMS band. These attendance guidelines also apply to activities held outside of the school day.

Excused Absence

Absences during the school day will be excused according to district guidelines. Absences from activities held outside the school day will be excused at the discretion of the directors. Appointments, tutorials etc. are not excuses for absence. Absences due to personal illness requiring medical attention, death in the family, or other extenuating circumstances (approved by director) may be considered for excused status. Students who are continually ill may be required to provide a doctor's note releasing them from participation. Absences should be discussed with a director to determine whether or not they will be excused.

Unexcused Absence

Students with an unexcused absence from any required band activity will receive a zero in the grade book. Rehearsals, concerts, contests, and competitions cannot be made up. Students with an unexcused absence to a Zero Block may be required to schedule a make-up time with their band director within one week.

Concerts/Performances

Concerts and performances are an integral component of the band curriculum. Students should consult their schedules for dates and times. Each of the concert ensembles will perform at various times throughout the school year and are mandatory. Periodically, the schedule may change and updates will be communicated. Concerts are considered to have three parts: call time, performance, and listening. For the student, the concert begins at the call time. Punctuality is essential. A concert concludes after the last group has performed and directors give permission for students to be dismissed. If a performance causes a student to miss another class, the student is responsible to make up all missed work.

Performances of the ensembles will include but are not limited to the following in 6th Grade:

- Christmas & Spring Concert
- Band festivals
- After school rehearsals
- Other events as scheduled

Daily Supplies

Each student should plan to bring the following items to rehearsals and/or performances. Other items may be added at the discretion of the directors.

- All issued music and music book
- Pencil/Highlighters
- Instrument (with case name tag)
- All supplies relative to their instrument
- Band binder (with labeled dividers)
- Korg TM-50 metronome/tuner (provided by band)
- Korg Contact Microphone Pickup (provided by band)
- Other equipment as needed

Grading Guidelines

GMS band programs have instructional objectives that relate to the mandated Mississippi Fine Arts framework for grade level subjects or courses. These objectives are aligned to address the academic skills needed for successful performance in the next grade or next course in a sequence of courses. Assignments, tests, projects, classroom activities, and other instructional activities are designed so that the student's performance indicates the level of mastery of the instructional objectives. The student's mastery level of these objectives is a major factor in determining the grade for a subject or course.

Students will be expected to meet the responsibilities for each band class as determined by the director. Since band is an academic music class with some extra-curricular activities attached, the band student's grade will reflect achievement in both curricular and extracurricular areas.

<u>General Grading Guidelines – 6th</u>

Students will be graded on the following scale:

- Weekly/Participation 34%
 - Responsibility: instrument and music supplies
 - o Rehearsal: on task and focused during rehearsals
 - o In class quizzes or formative assessments
- Performance 66%
 - Tests: Playing, written, and counting
 - Extension of Class: After school rehearsals, Concerts, Festivals.

The following list is provided to give students and parents examples of items that may be subject to grading. Additional assignments may be given at the discretion of the director.

- The student will receive a grade for each before or after school full rehearsal
- The student will be on task and focused during rehearsals.
- The student will have instrument, music, pencil, and supplies in rehearsals.
- The student will be prepared to play his/her part successfully.
- The student will mark music and take notes as needed.
- The student will be expected to improve individual music skills.
- The student's individual **skill development** will be evaluated through recorded music tests, individual playing tests, scale tests, and/or written tests.
- The student will be evaluated on improvement of ensemble skills during daily rehearsals.
- The student will be expected to improve his/her performance fundamentals.
- The student will be **evaluated for improvement** of his/her music fundamentals through daily observation during the "basics" part of each rehearsal and during sectionals.
- The student will be expected to demonstrate correct posture, hand position, embouchure, air production, and articulation as monitored during rehearsals.
- The student will receive a grade for each performance during a grading period.

Practice

The rewards of playing a musical instrument increase in direct proportion to the number of hours invested in individual practice. The key is to set aside a designated time every day for practice. It could be 10 - 30 minutes a day depending upon your family schedule. Set aside a time each day to ensure that practice is an important part of your daily studies.

Requirement for Advancement

Throughout the year, each student will be tested on several important musical concepts (scales and rhythms). These concepts are well within each student's grasp to master. Upon completion of these items within a specified timeframe, the student will be allowed to advance to the next year's class. Likewise, failure to complete the assignments at a mastery level in the specified timeframe will prevent the student from advancing to the next year's band. The following material must be performed in class, in front of a director, and passed with a demonstration of mastery of the material, per the rubric.

Scales:

Level 1 = Advance & Spring Trip – Complete by April 8th. (Bb, Eb, Ab, F, at least 1 octave Chromatic) Level 2 = Outstanding Award – Complete by April 22nd. (Bb, Eb, Ab, F, C, Db, G, and Chromatic)

Rhythm:



Level 1 = Advance & Spring Trip (1- 6 Rhythmic Concepts) – Complete by April 3rd Level 2 = Outstanding Award (1-8 Rhythmic Concepts) – Complete by April 24th

District-Owned Instruments

MCS provides a limited number of instruments for student use. These instruments include the bassoon, oboe, tenor saxophone, baritone saxophone, horn, euphonium, tuba, and general percussion equipment. This equipment is generally purchased by the school district for student use because of its expense. <u>Thus, all district-owned equipment must be handled with care.</u> Students failing to take proper care of their district-owned instruments may lose the privilege of using such instruments.

The following is a list of general procedures for district-owned instruments:

- Each instrument will be issued in good playing condition. Students are expected to maintain their issued instruments accordingly. *Any repairs or maintenance required due to a student's actions or neglect will be at the expense of the student who has signed for that instrument.*
- The band member is financially responsible for all equipment/materials checked out to them.
- All equipment and materials must be kept in their proper storage location when not in use.
- District-owned instruments are not to be treated as "free" instruments. Basic supplies must still be purchased and repairs must still be made. Please treat these instruments as if they were your own. Most district-owned instruments exceed \$2,500 in value.

Instrument Storage and Identification

Instrument shelves are to be used for instrumental storage ONLY!! Each student is assigned a specific area, which is to be kept clean. Instruments are to be put in their cases, and the cases kept closed and latched while in the storage area.

It is suggested that all personal instruments have the proper insurance coverage. Personal instruments ARE NOT insured by Germantown Middle School or Madison County School District.

Band students will take home their instruments and band binders every evening. Students are expected to practice regularly outside of band class and private lessons.

Students are not allowed to leave their instrument unattended at any time. There will be consequences for any student whose instrument is brought to us by another student, teacher, etc. -- whether it is found on or off school property.

Private Lesson Program

The Germantown Band Private Lesson Program offers private instruction from the finest graduate and professional musicians in the Jackson Metro area. The program is supported by the individual parents who cover the cost of the program. The cost for each lesson is determined by the instructors.

- ALL students are highly encouraged to take individualized private instruction.
- Teachers are screened and interviewed by the Germantown Band Program
- Lessons will be given weekly during the band classes, before, and after school.
- If there is a need for before/after school lessons, every effort will be made to schedule private lessons at times that do not conflict with other activities.
- Detailed information on the private lesson program is discussed at the end of this handbook.
- Private Lessons are AWESOME!

Concerts/Performances

Concerts and performances are frequent with all bands. Students should consult their schedules for dates and times. Periodically, the schedule will change and updates will be sent home and posted on the GMS Band website.

- Concerts are considered to have three parts: warm-up, performance, and listening.
- The concert begins for the student at the warm-up. *Punctuality is essential*. A concert concludes when the last group performs and directors have given permission for students to be dismissed. A general report time will be given for all students.
- All concerts are a group effort, thus, ATTENDENCE IS REQUIRED!!!
- All concerts are an extension of the classroom and will be graded accordingly.
- Students should be punctual and prepared for each performance/concert.
- In the event a performance causes a student to miss another class, the student is responsible to make up all missed work!
- The appropriate dress for all concerts will be a dress uniform (see Uniform Guidelines).

Uniform Guidelines

Formal uniform: **Dress nicely, NO JEANS, NO T-SHIRTS, NO SHORTS, NO ATHLETIC SHOES Example: Boys -** Polo shirt, khaki pants, & dress shoes or Button-down shirt w/ dress pants & shoes **Example: Girls -** Appropriate Dress with dress shoes

Informal uniform: Band T-shirt with blue jeans/khaki pants and/or shorts and tennis shoes.

Performance Locations

Throughout the year, band concerts will be held in the Germantown Middle School Gym. However, if space is available, concerts may be held at the Madison Central High School or Ridgeland High School Auditoriums. Specific locations for each concert will be listed either on the calendar or on information sent home prior to each performance.

Concert Behavior Expectations

Band students will exhibit proper concert behavior during all performances, in either their own band or as an audience member. Students will be graded on their behavior. Concert etiquette is an integral part of music education.

The following rules will be followed at all times:

- Talking is not permitted on stage or in the audience. It is disrespectful to the performers on stage and audience members.
- Do not distract the performing band in any way.
- Do not leave your seat for any reason during a performance. You will be given ample time to use the restroom and drinking fountain before a concert begins. If you must leave, do so as quietly and inconspicuously as possible (make sure the doors do not slam shut). Leave between songs only.
- No food or drink is allowed on stage, backstage, or in the seating area. This includes water bottles and gum.
- Cell phones must be turned off (not on vibrate or silent) and put away. Any student using a cell phone during a performance may have consequences.
- Move between the seating area and stage in quiet, single-file lines. Sit in your assigned seat/row.
 Do not talk as you enter or exit.
- Support your fellow band members with appropriate applause. Yelling, whistling, shouting names, etc. is not acceptable.
- Set a good example for the audience and other students. Other people may not know how to behave in a concert setting.
- We hope all parents and guests will stay for the concert when bringing a student to a concert. If a student needs to be picked up, please do so in a timely manner. Any student not picked up on time may not be allowed to participate in future GMS activities.
- Students are expected to stay for the entire concert.

Travel Guidelines

The band will frequently travel on either school buses or commercial buses. Students are expected to conduct themselves at the highest level on any trip.

Students who have been subject to school-level discipline in the course of the school year may be deemed ineligible to participate in extracurricular field trips, at the discretion of the director and/or campus administration.

Students must travel to events and return from events on the bus. Any student wishing to arrive or leave with his/her parent must notify a director in writing with parent signature, prior to the event. Permission will be granted or denied based on the circumstances of the occasion.

Students must have all necessary forms (Medical Release) completed and on file with the band office to travel on any trip with the band.

For the safety of all involved, while on the bus students will:

- Remain seated at all times.
- Sit properly in a forward position and not block the aisle.
- Keep the bus clear of food, drinks, and debris.
- Keep all body parts inside the bus.
- When allowed, use only approved type/headset radios (no speakers).
- Remain silent and attentive when addressed by an adult on the bus.
- Refrain from loud, boisterous talking, singing, screaming, whistling, inappropriate jokes, etc.
- No public displays of affection of any kind.

Special Note

As a member of the band, you are a representative of your school. Always be on your best behavior. If you are in doubt about an action, do not do it! Your conduct at all times should be considered a good reflection on the school, the band, your home, yourself, and the community.

<u>Chaperones</u> Adult chaperones are a great asset to the band program. Students will treat them as an extension of the band staff. Proper respect will be shown to all adults at all times. If your parent is interested in serving as a chaperone, please notify the band directors.

<u>Financial Requirement</u> The price of the beginner band trip is TBA. Cost vary depending upon travel expenses and destination.

Band Hall Hours

The band hall normally opens for section rehearsals at 7:00 am, and closes at 4:00 pm, except on Fridays or the day before a holiday – in which case the band hall will close at 3:45 pm. The band hall may be open for private lessons, as needed by the private lesson teachers.

Zero Block will be held from 7:30 – 8:15 am before school, and from 3:30 – 5:00 pm for After School Rehearsals. Sectional times may be adjusted when and if needed, depending on upcoming contests.

When no sectionals/rehearsals are being held, the band hall will open at 7:45am, and will close at 3:45 pm.

Parent Drop Off and Pick Up

Parents must make arrangements for transportation of their children to and from zero block, rehearsals, and to and from the band hall during trips and special events. Lack of transportation will not be an accepted excuse for missing a band function. To ensure the safety of their children, parents are encouraged to have a plan for drop-off and pick-up of students in a timely manner for all band events.

For the safety of all involved, students must go home after the band hall closes. Parents, please be aware that the main office will be closed before sectionals or rehearsals end. Family transportation and car pools are ways to help your child get home safely and in a timely manner.

Commitment to Band

In order to be a member of a performing group, each person must decide if he/she wants to make the commitment of time and dedication. For all school activities, the faculty and administration work together to make sure that students have the opportunity to participate in multiple activities. However, non-school activities, appointments, and other conflicts must not interfere with a student's commitment to band, to the other band members, or to the rehearsal and performance schedule given to you at the beginning of each semester

CHARMS

Please review the CHARMS information on the last page of this handbook. CHARMS is a student database and it is how we will keep you informed of upcoming calendar events, information, and current assignments. All student's first major test grade is to complete the CHARMS login check list.

Volunteers Needed

Throughout the school year, GMS Bands need parent volunteers to make our events run smoothly. Events ranging from help with the concession stand at home football games to chaperoning trips in the spring. Read through the description of each event and fill out the volunteer forms in Charms no later than August 20th, 2021.

- 1. Football Games GMS Football home games, we need your help running the concession stand.
- 2. Fall Fundraiser Parents are needed to help sort the fundraiser items and assist in checkout.
- 3. Trips Each grade level goes on at least one trip a year. Chaperones are needed to insure safety.

State Marching Championships

Volunteers Needed! This is a first for the Germantown Band Program. We are hosting the 1, 3, & 4A State Marching Band Championships Saturday, October 30th, 2021. This is a huge undertaking for the program and we need all the available help we can get to make sure this event runs smoothly!

We will need help with the concession stands, assisting with the guest bands, parking, etc. We will need at least 100 parents. Fill out the volunteer form Charms to help with State Championships.

Germantown Middle School Band Supply List

All supplies must be acquired by September 14th.

_ 1. Band Fee

There will be a mandatory fee of \$50 which will include the cost of the t-shirt, binder, and basic operating costs. See the last page for additional details.

_ 2. Lyre (7th and 8th Graders only)

A lyre is a little wire stand that grips or hooks on an instrument (except flute, oboe, tuba, bari sax and percussion). We will use them at the home 8th grade football games as well as 7th/8th High School Band night and students will continue to need them during their high school marching career. The biggest problem with lyres is how they fit onto their instrument. We recommend that each student take his or her own instrument to the store to make that sure it fits. This is especially true for trombone and baritone. A lyre averages \$5.00 to \$10.00.

_ 3. Flip Folder (7th and 8th Graders only)

A flip folder clips onto the lyre and actually holds the music. Students insert their music into clear sleeves of the folder so they can read their music. The cost of a flip folder usually averages \$5.00.

4. Metronome & Tuner - these are provided by the band

The two main ingredients in music are pitch (notes) and rhythm. Every band uses a metronome and tuner in class every day. It is only fitting that students practice with one at home as well. The easiest way to tell whether a musician sounds good (or bad) is whether they are in tune (or not). Like the metronome, all bands use tuners each day and it is only proper that students practice with one at home. The Korg TM-40 is a combination tuner and metronome and is approximately \$30.00.

_ 5. Wire Music Stand (recommended, not required)

A wire music stand allows students to practice at home with good posture as they do at school. A wire music stand averages \$20.00.

Private Lesson Benefits (Lessons are AWESOME!)

1. Private lesson teachers model a professional sound on their instrument.

How do babies learn to talk? By listening to people talk. How do instrumentalists learn to play with a characteristic sound? By hearing a characteristic sound.

2. Students can perform by themselves weekly and get concentrated feedback. In band, it is rare for students to perform by themselves and if they do, feedback us usually limited to 10-15 seconds. Performing weekly for a teacher helps them become a more confident and independent player. They also have more time to give feedback, try again and continue to work on a problem until it improves because it is an individual setting.

3. Students can focus on supplemental exercises written specifically for their instrument. These fundamentals are crucial for later development and more advanced playing ability.

4. **Method books written just for their instrument are far superior to band music for developing well-rounded players.** Method books, because of their methodical nature, do a much more complete job of covering full range, key signatures, rhythms, duets, alternate fingerings and styles than the curriculum in band class allows.

5. Region/district band auditions can be approached on an individual level. Teachers can meet a child where they are to begin the region band music and help them develop an individual game plan to prepare them for the audition. This helps students learn how to set goals - long term and weekly goals.

6. Instructors give students a chance to play a unique solo that they love at solo contest. Lesson teachers, experts on solos for their instruments, are able to offer students a number of solos that are ideal for their development level. They can also choose solos that work on goals for that student such as focusing on objectives such as extending range, improving articulation, or extreme key signatures

7. Private lesson teachers provide a role model for students that can be a strong motivation for students to continue in band and excel on an individual level. While students move through different classes, grade levels and schools, it is possible they would have the same lesson teacher for 7 or more years. Lesson teachers often have a long-term plan for each student's development. Private teachers can guide a student all the way from the first sounds in beginner band through a professional level solo as a senior in high school and they know how to get them from one point to the next.
