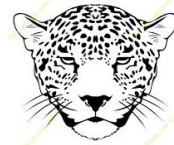

bundled (bundle) to tie or wrap together; make into a bundle

label a piece of paper or cloth that is sewed, glued, or fastened to something. A label tells what something is, who it belongs to, or who made it

mailing (mail) to send by way of the post office; put in a mailbox

station a regular stopping place along a route
