Reporting Modern Conflicts

n the earliest hours of the New Year, two deadly assaults were carried out and shocked the nation. The attacks combined left 15 people dead and 42 injured. In-depth investigations conducted by news agencies, police departments, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) are currently ongoing as the nation attempts to understand these brutal acts of violence.

The first of the two attacks was carried out from 12:45 a.m. to 3:15 a.m. on January 1. The assault began when a man suspected to be Shamsud-Din Jabbar was seen on closed circuit television (CCTV) tapes leaving a drink cooler, which was full of improvised explosive devices (IED), in the middle of congested crowds of partygoers on Bourbon and Peter Street, New Orleans. Almost thirty minutes later, Jabbar proceeded to do the same with another cooler on Bourbon and Toulouse Street. Then, approximately fifty minutes later at 3:15 a.m., Jabbar drove his rented Ford F-150 into crowds of hundreds of people celebrating the New Year, taking at least a confirmed 14 lives and injuring 35 others. Soon after, Jabbar crashed the rental car and was killed in a shoot-out with New Orleans police. The attack has been labeled by the FBI as a terrorist attack because it was a premeditated, violent attack which stemmed from political influences. While Jabbar's motives behind the attack are not known with full certainty, he aired political grievances in a series of videos posted on facebook hours before the attack. Accord-

ing to Cable News Network (CNN), Jabbar is quoted as having said he wanted headlines to, "focus on the war between believers and disbelievers," however it is unclear as to the meaning behind his words. Jabbar was born and raised in Texas, and his family members are said to be shocked by his actions, as there were no prior signs of violence from him. Jabbar was in the United States military and served in Afghanistan from 2009 to 2010. It has been questioned by news outlets if Jabbar developed post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) or other mental health issues from his time in Afghanistan, potentially contributing to his actions. Similar concerns have been raised in the conversation

These attacks starkly reflect the current political climate seeing as both perpetrators issued statements prior to the attacks about having to commit a showy act of violence to get their views across. "Over the past decade, polarization has increased significantly throughout the United States," wrote Bruce Pang (10). "Social media platforms often push extreme views for engagement and people get stuck in echo chambers that reinforce extreme views. This lends itself to a broader trend of political violence being more normalized as a valid method of protest." The prevalence of political unrest has undoubtedly contributed to an increased violent nature of United States politics. This is, in part, due to the fact that both sides of the political sphere seem to feel disenchanted by their ability to facilitate change within their government. Americans feel outcast by their own government. Evidently, Pang is not alone in his view that social media may be a factor in violent acts such as these. Cam Ogletree, one of Madison Central (MC) High School's teachers at the Engineering Academy and Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles, expressed a similar belief on

the role social media plays in contributing to violent or extreme actions. Ogletree articulated, "I do believe in free speech, but I also believe that the internet, especially social media, has led to too much hate speech and access to influencers who may inadvertently affect mentally disturbed, delusional, and/or unhappy people who act out in violent ways." On social media, mental illness is either too emphasized or completely ignored. It can have negative effects on those predisposed to or suffering from an existing mental health issue.

The FBI is conducting an ongoing investigation into the tragic events which took place on New Years Eve. The country will continue to mourn those whose lives were lost in such senseless acts of violence. These traumatic events are ones the United States government will recover from, continue to improve upon, and learn from the factors which created the environment for these violent acts to occur, and work to prevent tragedies such as these in the future. In the future, one would hope that no one loses a loved one in a brutal, fruitless political statement.



n Monday, January 20, 2025, the United States inaugurated its 47th president, Donald Trump. Congress certified his win with 312 electoral votes on January 6. Trump makes history with his win as he is now the second president to hold two non-consecutive terms, meaning he has two presidential numbers, 45 and 47. The only other person in American history to hold two non-consecutive presidential terms was Grover Cleveland, who was the 22 and 24 president of the



ber 15, 2022 and was formally nominated by the Republican party in July of 2024 at the Republican National Convention. The main themes and policy initiatives Trump stressed during his rallies and campaign were very similar to his policy agenda in 2016. from going into force. Many influential and wealthy people, such as Elon Musk, Jeff Bezos, and Mark Zuckerberg, were among the crowd. Musk has explicitly shown much support for Donald Trump throughout his campaign and now presidential term. Musk was also nominated for chair of the Department of Government Efficiency.

Donald Trump's campaign, inauguration, and second term have already made history. He has and will continue to make a significant impact on the trajectory of our nation.

Manhattan Traffic Tolling

January 5, 2025, the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) instated a toll on most traffic in lower Manhattan. The purpose of this toll is to decongest the high traffic of a densely populated area. This is a good thing because the current traffic in Manhattan is inefficient and harmful to the environment, and people have taken notice.

The toll will be in effect from 5 am to 9 pm, and it will be distributed online by E-ZPass. If one does not have an E-ZPass account, they will be sent an increased toll in the mail. The

charges adapt based on the vehicle and the time of day. The price ranges from \$1.05 to \$21.60 for the day. For most people, it will be cheaper to use public transportation than to use a personal car, and some discounts and exemptions will be offered for low income or disabled individuals. The traffic is slow, and it almost never speeds

up. When speeds drag, so

does everything else. Ambulances, taxis, buses, and person-

al vehicles all contribute and suffer from the congestion in lower Manhattan. Lower speeds mean less work is done: employees are late, taxis are stuck, and food delivery cannot get anywhere. The sluggishness of traffic is an issue that can be fixed by simply having less cars on the road,


The front office and library have workers who help with the workload within the job. These students sign up for electives that help around the school with staff to make a difference. The student library and office workers help deliver papers and


how


