projectile

(n) - something, such as a bullet or rocket, that is shot from a weapon; something, such as a rock, that is thrown as a weapon

The boy used his slingshot to launch the **projectile** into the air.

conjecture

(n) - an opinion or idea formed without proof or sufficient evidenceThat is not a reliable resource since it is based on conjecture and not facts.

trajectory

(n) - the curved path along which something, such as a rocket, moves through the air or through space

The angle of the cannon will affect the trajectory of the cannon ball.

concept

(n) - an idea of what something is or how it worksDividing and multiplying fractions can be a difficult concept to understand.

intercept

(v) - to stop and take someone or something that is going from one place to another place before that person or thing gets there

Be careful when passing notes to me, because Maurice will try to intercept it.

receptive

(adj) - willing to listen to or accept ideas, suggestions, etc.

Michelle is very open-minded and very receptive to new ideas and change.

perceptive

(adj) - having or showing an ability to understand or notice something easily or quickly

My brother is very **perceptive** so it will be difficult to hide our plans for his surprise birthday party.

receipt

(n) - a piece of paper on which the things that you buy or the services that you pay for are listed with the total amount paid and the prices for each; the act of receiving something

You will need to pay for the merchandise upon **receipt** of the items.

conceit

(n) - too much pride in your own worth or goodness

Because of her **conceit**, she was not the most well-liked student at school.

deceive

(v) - to make someone believe something that is not true

The Kallima butterfly can **deceive** its predators into thinking it's a dead leaf.
