### AP® ENGLISH IV EXPECTATIONS AND SYLLABUS

### WELCOME

It is going to be a great year! I am so excited for the year ahead and so glad that I get to spend it with you. I am excited for the challenge of AP Literature, and for the opportunity to see you excel.

### COURSE OVERVIEW

This open enrollment college level course includes an intensive study of American and British literary works written in several genres from the sixteenth century to the present. The curriculum requirements are based on the AP® English course description and are intended to fully prepare each student for the corresponding College Board exam at the end of the academic year.

The concentration of this course's content is the study of the artistic use of language in increasing complexity as employed by skilled authors to achieve specific effects on their readers. Evaluation of student progress will be through in class and out-of-class writing assignments, content quizzes over the reading assignments, and projects designed to encourage critical thinking and literary analysis.

"Students will engage in the careful reading and critical analysis of imaginative literature. Through this close reading of selected texts, students should deepen their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers. As they read, students should consider a work's structure, style, and themes as well as smaller-scale elements as the use of figurative language, imagery, symbolism, and tone" (College Board 2004). \*Course Overview adapted from Round Rock HS's AP® English Literature and Composition syllabus\*

### BIG IDEAS

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"The big ideas serve as the foundation of the AP® English Literature and Composition course and enable students to create meaningful connections among course concepts. They are threads that run throughout the course and revisiting them and applying them in a variety of contexts helps students to develop deeper conceptual understanding. Below are the big ideas of the course, along with the enduring understanding associated with each one" (College Board 2019).

- CHARACTER
  - Enduring Understanding: Characters in literature allow readers to study and explore a range of values, beliefs, assumptions, biases, and cultural norms represented by those characters.
- SETTING
  - Enduring Understanding: Setting and the details associated with it not only depict a time and place, but also convey values associated with that setting.
- STRUCTURE
  - Enduring Understanding: The arrangement of the parts and sections of a text, the relationship of the parts to each other, and the sequence in which the text reveals information are all structural choices made by a writer that contribute to the reader's interpretation of a text.
- NARRATION
  - Enduring Understanding: A narrator's or speaker's perspective controls the details and emphases that affect how readers experience and interpret a text.
- FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE
  - Enduring Understanding: Comparisons, representations, and associations shift meaning from the literal to the figurative and invite readers to interpret a text.
- LITERARY ARGUMENTATION
  - Enduring Understanding: Readers establish and communicate their interpretations of literature through arguments supported by textual evidence.
